
For centuries, it has been a leading centre of learning and research with great impact and influence.



PERSONAL STATEMENTS



WHAT IS IT?

Your chance to explain to universities why you want to study your chosen course



Should be **academic content** such as building on your school, super-curricular activities and any work experience.

Should be **extra-curricular content** for the benefit of other universities such as clubs, societies and part time work not linked to your chosen subject.









WRITING A PARAGRAPH

Writing your statement involves critically thinking about what you like about your chosen subject and what you've done to show it.

- **1. Discuss**, don't list
- 2. Depth rather than breadth
- **3. Read** everything you claim to
- 4. Be critical and analytical



ADMISSIONS TESTS & WRITTEN WORK



TAKING THE TEST

You will take the test at a **local** registered test centre (this is probably your school).

Make sure you get your test candidate entry number from your school or test centre as proof of entry by **6pm on 15 October.**





HOW TO PREPARE The best way to prepare is to do some practice papers!

The test is designed to be difficult and you are not expected to get top marks. These tend to be more skills based than knowledge based.

It will probably be on a topic unfamiliar to you. This is to see if you have the skills needed for your course.



WRITTEN WORK

Written work is just a piece of school-work you have already done that you send to us.

- You should check the requirements for written work, it varies for each subject
- Pick something on a topic that you like as you may be asked about it at interview
- Email the written work to your chosen college (or submit as requested by College Cambridge).

The deadline for submitting written work is 10 November (Oxford).



INTERVIEWS



WHAT TO EXPECT

- In Oxford: Either 2-3 days in Oxford or online interviews (may be interviewed at more than 1 college)
- In Cambridge: Usually 1 day in Cambridge or online interviews (interviewed at 1 college)
- At least 2 interviews
- Usually **2 interviewers** in each interview
- Interviews usually last 20+ minutes

We use interviews to see if you would suit the tutorial/supervision system, to see if you suit your course and to see how you think



TYPES OF QUESTIONS

Analysis of a prepared text, picture or object/specimen

What do you think about current topics (relating to your subject area)? Building on existing knowledge from current or previous studies (personal statement and written work may be used here) Descriptions of presented material

Problem solving

There are no trick questions or hidden agendas



HOW TO PREPARE DO... DON'T...

- ✓ Get used to thinking out loud
- Talk to anyone you can about your subject
- Review your personal statement/written work, anything you said you'd read
- Think about your subject in the wider world (keep up with the news)

- X Panic- the tutors will understand you're nervous and be trying to help you
- X Prepare speeches/answers for questions you think may come up-

HOW you think is what is important

X Do last minute **revision**- you can't revise for an interview



UNDERSTANDING YOU IN CONTEXT


We want to understand your achievements in the context of your individual background. To do this, we look at a range of publicly available data.


- This includes:
- Information about the applicant's school and the school's performance at GCSE and A-level
- Information about the applicant's neighbourhood

An applicant's experience in the care system

 This information helps us to understand more about each candidate's particular circumstances and to compare them fairly with all other applicants.
