


# HISTORY @ WBS YEAR 12 ROADMAP

**AIM:** A Level develops your skills from GCSE in the comparison of source material and making judgements on the interpretations of events made by contemporaries and historians. You will develop your ability to write a persuasive argument which takes account of different interpretations grounded in a thorough understanding of the events of Russia 1855-1964 and Modern Britain 1951-2007. You will also study the USA 1763 to 1865 for the NEA.

	RUSSIA & MODERN BRITAIN	ASSESSMENT
AUTUMN TERM	<p><b>RUSSIA:</b> An introduction to 19th Century Russia, society, politics and people. Alexander II and reforms, radical thinking and opposition to the Tsars. Industrial change, problems in the countryside. Nicholas I and the 1905 Revolution.</p> <p><b>MODERN BRITAIN:</b> Post-War Britain and the problems and opportunities after WWII, the Conservative Governments of Churchill, MacMillan, Eden and Home, the divisions within the Labour Party, culture, society and politics. 1951-64: the establishment and economic issues.</p>	<p>Assessment at A Level comprises of an interpretation response on Russia and the USSR and a source response on Modern Britain. You will complete two essay questions from a choice of three.</p> <p>Lesson time is specifically used to teach the examination style and technique, and includes opportunities to write responses outside of the formal key assessments.</p> <p>Year 12 key assessments are 45 minutes across 5 key dates and you will sit key assessments on one side of the course in an alternate pattern. KAs are scheduled for 3rd October, 2nd December, 30th January, 27th April and the 26th June.</p> <p>NEA submission is in January 2024.</p> 
SPRING TERM	<p><b>USA &amp; MODERN BRITAIN</b></p> <p><b>USA:</b> Teaching of the 100 years context including the outcome of the Seven Years' War, British rule, the American Revolution and Wars of Independence. The first Congress, slavery, westward expansion, economic development, the abolition movement, Southern and Northern differences, the crises of the 1850s, secession and the US Civil War.</p> <p><b>MODERN BRITAIN:</b> Foreign policy, Eden and the Winds of Change, nuclear deterrent and relations with the USSR. Labour victory in 1964, economic, social and political events up to 1970 and Northern Ireland.</p>	<p><b>HOMEWORK AND REVISION</b></p> <p>You will be set reading and note taking tasks as well as presentations, interpretation exercises and source analysis.</p> <p>Revision exercises run throughout the year and are embedded in the teaching,</p> <p>Revision guides will be available and tasks are also set in the run up to internal examinations.</p>
SUMMER TERM	<p><b>RUSSIA/USSR &amp; MODERN BRITAIN</b></p> <p><b>RUSSIA:</b> The October Manifesto, reforms and reaction of Nicholas II, the Four Dumas, the First World War, the Russian home front, causes of the 1917 February Revolution, the Dual Authority, Lenin and the causes of the October Revolution.</p> <p><b>MODERN BRITAIN:</b> Race and immigration, the permissive society, swinging sixties? The media and popular culture, feminism. Heath, the economy, Wilson and Callaghan.</p>	<p><b>ENRICHMENT THEMES</b></p> <p>Cultural capital in students' understanding of the role of culture: art, theatre and music in creating a society, the origins of religious conflict in Britain. Understanding the impact made both in Britain and Russia/USSR when power is invested in a group of people rather than a monarchy.</p> <p>Transferable skills of handling conflicting opinions, a wide range of evidence and making judgements.</p>
