A-LEVEL POLITICS (US GOV) @ WBS YEAR 13 ROADMAP

AIM

Second year of the A-level focuses on a mixture of US Government and Politics and Political Ideologies. Through the year, students will study various aspects of political and democratic life within the USA, they will apply this knowledge in an analytic and evaluative manner through a series of questions and debates aimed at exploring the depths of their understanding- they will be required to compare various aspects with their British counterparts. Debates will be harder to perform for this side of the course; more emphasis will be placed on the theoretical approaches needed within this paper. Throughout the year, they will be expected to use relevant and up to date examples which give a broader understanding to that which they gain from the information laid out in the AQA specification. As the UK political system and the US political system are in a state of flux, students will be expected to have some understanding of current affairs and be able to apply these in the correct manner- this is especially the case as the USA will be experiencing the run-up to the 2024 Presidential election

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SPRING TERM

Students will sit their terminal exams at the end of their two year study. Paper One uses the content from Y12, addressing UK Government and Politics. Paper Two builds on knowledge of the UK political system and compares it with the US political system. Paper Three addresses Political Ideologies across a wide range of political systems, a holistic approach is required when addressing this paper. Students will be able to face these exams with confidence having received advice, feedback and guidance for all three of these papers across the two years.
