## A-LEVEL POLITICS (POLITICAL IDEOLOGIES) @ WBS YEAR 13 ROADMAP

AIM

Second year of the A-level focuses on a mixture of US Government and Politics and Political Ideologies. Paper Three provides students with the knowledge and understanding of ideology and how that informs political discussion, debate and controversy. Students will cover three core ideologies: Liberalism, Conservatism and Socialism, they will also study one optional (modern) ideology. Students will be required to make a variety of synoptic links with both Paper One and Paper Two content- arguably this is the hardest of the three papers as it is philosophical and asks 'big picture' questions - students will be able to discuss more nuanced ideas such as the concept of human nature, society and the state.

#### TOPIC 4: OPTIONAL (FEMINISM)

- Different types of Feminism (key thinkers)
- Tensions within Feminism
- Feminism today: is it still a man's world?

# WHERE NEXT?

Students will sit their terminal exams at the end of their two year study. Paper One uses the content from Y12, addressing UK Government and Politics. Paper Two builds on knowledge of the UK political system and compares it with the US political system. Paper Three addresses Political Ideologies across a wide range of political systems, a holistic approach is required when addressing this paper. Students will be able to face these exams with confidence having received advice, feedback and guidance for all three of these papers across the two years.
