Subject Aim: Year 8 RE seeks to facilitate students learning in 2 key ways; by deepening students understanding of two Abrahamic faiths and by engaging with modern issues that require us to not only act ethically but also understand the reasoning behind our actions. Students will draw upon their previous topics of questioning and key religious figures regularly in order to find success in year 8.

TTP Autumn Term	Students will engage with some the origins of law from the Old Testament and ways in which laws have adapted and changed since then Students will learn skills such as debate, analysis of an argument as well as think reflectively about their life and how important rules are to them. Students leaving this topic will be able to describe key elements of Judaism using key terms, make links from Old Testament laws to their lives and critique the importance of rules and laws	Formal Assessment will take place at 3 Key Assessment points. All Key Assessments will be open book and answer one or two key questions about the topic. Key Assessment will take place in Topic 1, Topic 2 and Topic 3. All Assessments are long form written tasks supported for each student.

Students leaving the topic will be able to think reflectively about how religious beliefs affects them.
