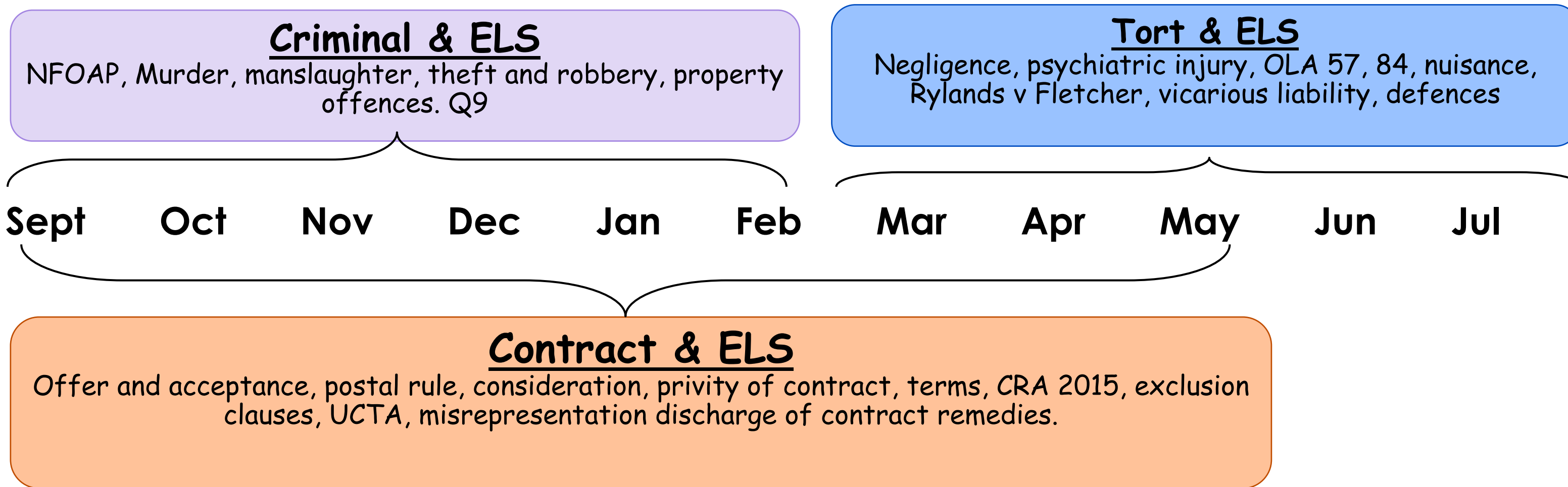
Law is the study of the rules that govern society and the principles that underpin justice.

Throughout the AQA A-level Law course, students will explore how laws are made and interpreted, how the legal system operates, and how justice is delivered in practice. Key areas of study include **Criminal Law**, where students examine offences such as assault, theft, and murder; **Tort Law**, which looks at issues like negligence, occupiers' liability, and remedies; and **Contract Law**, which covers the formation, terms, and enforcement of agreements.

Students will develop the ability to analyse legal scenarios, apply legal rules accurately, and construct logical, well-reasoned arguments. By the end of the course, students will think like legal scholars—understanding how the law functions, how it evolves, and how it balances the rights and responsibilities of individuals.

Law enables students to understand the impact of legal rules on everyday life and the wider society. It encourages reflection on justice, morality, and fairness, and develops essential skills such as critical thinking, problem-solving, and effective communication. Students will also consider wider issues such as judicial precedent, statutory interpretation, and the relationship between law and morality.

The analytical and evaluative skills gained through studying A-level Law are highly transferable and valued in a wide range of careers, including law, criminology, policing, politics, business, and public service.
